The club more or less let's me do my own thing, but generally pretends I don't exist. That's fine by me. I just want to have fun and they let me do it.

What are the talents Cabeza de Carne ? As you dance or special songs for example? I'm fat. That's my super power. I also ride an adult bigwheel sometimes. I CAN do an awesome karaoke version of Baby Got Back, but I have yet to find a situation where that would save someone's life!

Carne Cabeza is a new character. How was the fan Neal before becoming luchador? I had my gripes with the owner, Angelos. It appeared he was only interested in making money off the fans. It appeared that he had no interest in putting together a winning team. The past couple of years, I have completely changed my opinion. Yes, the team got better, and yes that helps. What really changed my opinion was the changes made at the stadium, itself. You might not even notice the subtle changes overtly, but most people can agree that the experience at Camden Yards is far better nowadays. There's a shuttle that takes people to their cars, the menu offerings at the stadium are MUCH better. There's a rooftop bar located in centerfield. Little things that have added up, completely changed me from the Orioles curmudgeon to the "super" fan I am today!

Are there any other unusual fans in the stands of Camden Yards? Are you related to them? Yes, There are plenty of Oriole "Super" fans. Romeo Santos, Captain O, and even a guy that dresses up as the Oriole's version of Macho Man. I'm not alone in public displays of Oriole affection!

The Orioles have a glorious history but also had dark years, deep in the MLB, especially before the renewal of the 2012 season. How do we live this history between heroes and losers being a fan? Some people want to claim to be "die-hard" fans. And that is fine. People want to

Generally speaking, you can be an Orioles fan and NOT a Ravens fan (most likely you'd be a Redskins fan), BUT pretty much ALL Ravens fans are Oriole fans. There's also a staggering difference between a baseball fan and a football fan. I get a lot more love from baseball fans than football. It's pure speculation, but I think it's because there are opportunities to be distracted in a baseball game, where you have to watch every football play in it's entirety.

Which players or managers, past and present, best symbolize the Orioles? I believe the heyday of Baltimore Baseball happened in the mid to late 80's when we had Earl Weaver coaching Cal Ripken and Eddie Murray. Those guys epitomized Baltimore. Hard working, blue color, grind it out coaches/players. That's how we view the blue collar town that is Baltimore!

How do you see the current season and the next for the team? I do not like making predictions. I am too superstitious for that. With that being said, I do see us being very competitive in our division. We can take on, and beat anyone in the AL East. The season still needs to be played out, but I can see us having success. The future, however, leaves much more uncertanty. We NEED to be able to extend the contracts of our core players (JJ Hardy, Manny Machado, Matt Wieters, Chris Davis, etc). If we cannot do that, and revert to the Orioles of the 2000's, we could easily drop straight back to the cellar. If we CAN manage to do the right thing, and keep our guys, we could be VERY good for years to come!
